Spitfire, Hurricane and the RAF's best will enthral you as Europe's biggest WWII airshow captivates your senses and imagination. Take the morning to explore the extraordinary collection at RAF Duxford. Witness a family's moving tribute to a lost brother, when we visit an operational WWII airfield, complete with Lancaster bomber. If you wish, you will share the cockpit of a Spitfire or Mustang for the flight experience of your life! Tour the Battle of Britain Bunker at RAF Uxbridge. Sit in Sir Winston's chair as you view the room that must have been alive with action and tension through the summer of 1940. Continuing your journey with Churchill, experience, in three dimensions, the history that was pivotal in changing the course of the world. Meet Churchill at his family home, Chartwell House. Kick up your heels around a Spitfire and Hurricane, in an original hangar in 1940's dress uniform at the Battle of Britain Ball. This tour will invoke the presence of Churchill and *The Few* that saved Britain in its darkest hour. It captures the spirit and courage of the great aviators of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. Return home having fulfilled a dream and with a flying bag full of priceless memories.

#### DAY 2 LONDON – CIRENCESTER

#### **BATTLE OF BRITAIN BUNKER**

The Battle of Britain Bunker is the Royal Air Force's primary Force Development and Public Engagement asset. The Bunker housed the Fighter Command No.11 Group Operations Room throughout the Second World War, the room from which most of the RAF's side of the Battle of Britain was coordinated. Key decisions that would decide the fate of the nation were taken in the Bunker throughout 1940 and it was thanks to the tireless work of the plotters and controllers that the RAF's fighter pilots managed to keep the Luftwaffe at bay

This afternoon, begin your tour of the Cotswolds and drive approximately 45 minutes to **Moreton-in-Marsh** 

#### THE COTSWOLDS

This region of outstanding natural beauty is characterised by attractive small towns and thatched villages of yellow Cotswold stone, made prosperous by the historic wool trade. With a variety of different villages there is something to see around every corner of the Cotswolds. Today the group will visit some of the Cotswolds most charming and picturesque villages and towns, **Moreton-in-Marsh**, **Stow on the Wold**, **Bourton-on-the-Water** and **the Slaughters** 

#### **MORETON-IN-MARSH**

Moreton-in-Marsh is a thriving market town, dating back 1000 years to the Saxon era. Its broad High Street is lined with elegant 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> century buildings, among them the White Hart Royal, a former manor house in which King Charles I sheltered during the Civil War. The Redesdale Market Hall dominates the main thoroughfare and is still used today for antique fairs and flea markets with its steeply pitched roof and attractive and distinctive clock turret. The Curfew Tower is one of the few surviving in Britain and at its base is housed of this tower is the old town lock-up



#### STOW ON THE WOLD

**Stow on the Wold** is a beautiful town and one the busiest of all the cotswold towns. Standing 800 feet above sea level, it is also the highest of the Cotswold towns. Many years ago when the cotswold wool industry was at it's height, Stow on the Wold was famous for it's huge annual fairs where as many as 20,000 sheep were sold at a time at the busy market square. The square is now mainly used for parking, as Stow on the Wold has become a favourite destination for many a visitor to the Cotswolds





Depart the Cotswolds and drive approximately 2 hours to Cirencester

#### **HIGHCLERE CASTLE**

Highclere Castle is a beautiful building and a warm, welcoming home to visitors and guests at events and celebrations held here. Apart from exploring the Castle, the Egyptian Exhibition fascinates adults and children, whilst the surrounding Grounds and Gardens provide peace and tranquillity. When you visit, you will recognise many rooms from "Downton Abbey." You will see the Drawing Room in which Maggie Smith delivered many a withering comment to some unfortunate relation. In addition you can also find Tutankhamun in the cellars

#### **WILTSHIRE**

Wiltshire is characterised by its high downland and wide valleys, with a history spanning over 6,000 years. Wiltshire has plenty of history to be explored and the most iconic of Wiltshire's sites is of course Stonehenge. To this day there is still a mystery as to the reasons behind the site and how the stones were transported from as far away as Wales. Further north is **Avebury**, the largest stone circle in the world. Dating from around 4,500 years ago, Avebury together with Stonehenge form part of the World Heritage Site

Complementing the 'wow' factor in the air is the authentic 1940s atmosphere. Take your seats, sit back and prepare to be enthralled by the Flying Legends Air show 2015. The 22nd Edition of this world famous aerial spectacular will be held at the iconic Duxford airfield

Enjoy world class, unrivalled, choreographed displays featuring unique aircraft types rarely seen together in the UK skies or anywhere else. Flying Legends culminates in the finale Balbo formation when all the WWII fighters take to the skies to salute you in a mass flypast. Step back in time and enjoy the New York Manhattan dolls, enjoy a glass of Pimms, try out a full size Spitfire for size, view the large scale model aircraft exhibits and ladies, have your vintage makeup done. Flying Legends is the Air show not to miss, it has something for everyone!

#### **CAMBRIDGE**

Filled with exquisite architecture and oozing history and tradition, Cambridge is a very special university town. The buildings here appear to be unchanged and the best way to experience this beautiful city is with a **guided walking tour**. Hear about the famous people connected with Cambridge whilst visiting some of the best-known and most impressive sights the city has to offer. The tour will include at least two of Cambridge University's more famous colleges. Entrance to the magnificent King's College and Chapel and beautiful Queens' College is included. You will also see the lovely River Cam, which flows gently through the town



#### **KINGS COLLEGE**

Henry VI (1421-1471) founded King's College in 1441. The College's buildings were intended to be a magnificent display of the power of royal patronage and Henry went to great lengths to ensure that King's College Chapel would be unequalled in size and beauty. Henry's full plans were never carried out. Most of the original College buildings were on the north and east sides of the Chapel and have long since been demolished. King's College Chapel is one of the most famous medieval buildings in England. The foundation stone was laid in 1446 and it took over a century to build, including an interruption by the War of the Roses. The Chapel houses The Adoration of the Magi by Rubens, painted in 1634 for the Convent of the White Nuns at Louvain in Belgium. The Chapel is probably best known for the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, broadcast around the world on Christmas Eve





#### **QUEENS' COLLEGE**

Queens' College is a constituent college of the University of Cambridge. Queens' is amongst the oldest and largest colleges of the university, founded in 1448 by Margaret of Anjou (the Queen of Henry VI, who founded King's College). It has some of the most recognisable buildings in Cambridge.

The college spans both sides of the River Cam, colloquially referred to as the "light side" and the "dark side", with the world famous Mathematical Bridge connecting the two



#### **RIVER CAM**

The River Cam runs through the heart of Cambridge enabling you to enjoy fantastic views of the world famous Cambridge College. King's College Chapel, the Wren Library at Trinity College and the Bridge of Sighs, are just some of the famous Cambridge landmarks you can expect to see

After the **guided tour**, you may also wish to visit some of Cambridge's Museums. The University museums and collections are all within a short walking distance of the city centre. Explore more than five million works of art, artefacts and specimens in one square mile of Cambridge! Some of the museums you may choose from are: the Whipple Museum of the History of Science, The Fitzwilliam Museum, Kettle's Yard, the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology, the Sedgewick Museum of Earth and the Polar Museum

Your coach will pick up the aviation group and return to Cambridge where you will all meet for dinner

#### 10:00-6:00pm IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM

Explore atmospheric exhibitions and discover historic objects. The museum is set within a historic site where you can learn about Duxford's role in the First World War, Second World War and the Cold War. IWM Duxford is nearly a mile long with 7 impressive exhibition spaces, including contemporary award-winning exhibitions which will take you on an unforgettable journey through times of war and peace

Take time to explore the historic site and stroll amongst the well-preserved hangars and buildings







#### **Alternative**

Today you will explore the town of **Ely**, a short drive from Cambridge

#### **ELY**

Ely is a small but charming village dominated by an enormous cathedral. It takes its name from the eels that once inhabited the undrained Fens surrounding the town. Your visit will include Ely Cathedral including the Stained Glass Museum, Oliver Cromwell's House and time to explore the shops and galleries. You may also like to walk along the beautiful waterside or follow the eel trail, an excellent way of seeing historic Ely at its best

#### 7:00-6:30pm

#### **ELY CATHEDRAL**

The story of Ely Cathedral begins in Saxon Times with the life of its founder, St. Etheldreda. Etheldreda, who died in 679, was queen, foundress and abbess of Ely. She restored an old church at Ely and built her monastery on the site of what is now Ely Cathedral. After 200 years of flourishing, it

was destroyed by the Danes and was restored in 970 to become the richest abbey in England with the exception of Glastonbury. Etheldreda became a saint as a result of the discovery of her perfect body and its linen wrappings 17 years after her death from the plague. For centuries, Etheldreda's shrine was the focus for vast numbers of medieval pilgrims. The shrine was destroyed in 1541, but a slate in the Cathedral marks the spot where it stood and two days are still kept as major festivals in the Cathedral



#### 12:00-4:30pm STAINED GLASS MUSEUM

The stained glass museum exhibits a national collection of stained glass, religious and secular, from 1200 to the present day. This unique museum offers an insight into the history and techniques of stained glass. For at least thirteen hundred years the art has been practised in Britain. Learn the secrets of this ancient craft and glimpse its role in the unfolding story of British hi story. The Main Gallery contains displays of stained glass windows ranging over eight centuries in specially illuminated cases. It offers a rare opportunity to view stained glass up close,



to compare windows produced at different times, in different styles and different settings

#### 10:00-5:00pm OLIVER CROMWELL'S HOUSE

Oliver Cromwell, Lord Protector of England, lived in Ely for 10 years. Experience what domestic life would have been like in the 17th Century in a variety of re-created period rooms as well an exhibition detailing the Civil War. Visit Mrs Cromwell's kitchen, try dressing-up or playing with the toys of the time or venture into the Haunted Bedroom if you dare!



Return to Cambridge and re-join the group

#### **Morning**

Board the coach for the drive to **Spilsby** which will take around 3 hours

#### **Main Group**

Today you will visit the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight at RAF Coningsby and take a guided tour

#### 10:30am

#### **BATTLE OF BRITAIN MEMORIAL FLIGHT**

The RAF BBMF hangar is located within the boundaries of RAF Coningsby and viewing the Flight's historic aircraft at close quarters is only available by guided tour. You will be shown around the hangar by volunteer guides, many of whom have firsthand experience of the aircraft. Whilst in the hangar you will be able to observe the RAF BBMF technicians maintaining these iconic aircraft to airworthy condition

#### **Alternative**

The town of Lincoln is known as the cathedral city and is home to the Cathedral's copy of Magna Carta with its eighteenth and nineteenth century prisons and its chilling nineteenth century prison chapel, dating back to the 13th century. There are many different places to explore in this area including the Lincoln Castle, the Collection and the Usher Gallery. Not far away is Doddington Hall with its fascinating connection with the Cathedral through its first owner Tommy Taylor. Katherine Swynford wife of John of Gaunt, whose mortal remains lie in the Cathedral, lived at Kettle Thorpe only ten miles from Lincoln. The early Bishops lived in the Medieval Bishops' Palace. Bishop Edward King (1890-1915) lived in the Old Palace where his chapel is still in use

#### 7:15-6:00pm

#### LINCOLN CATHEDRAL

One of Europe's finest examples of Gothic Architecture; Lincoln Cathedral also owns one of only four remaining original copies of 1215 Magna Carta. Visitors to the cathedral can tour the stunning nave on a floor tour, learn how Lincoln Cathedral was taller than the Pyramids of Giza and hear the myth of the Lincoln Imp and see if you can catch a glimpse of the little character hidden in the nave!



#### 10:00-4:00pm LINCOLN CASTLE

Lincoln castle has over 900 years of history during which it has operated as a castle, a prison and a court. During Norman times, Lincoln was the third most important city in England and was therefore the location for one of the first castles to be built by William the Conqueror. Several battles involved the castle during the reign of King Stephen and King but many of the original have survived for visitors to see today. Lincoln castle is also one of only two castles in the country to have two mottes. One of the main attractions of the castle is its possession of a copy of the original Magna Carta



According to a 14th-century legend, two mischievous creatures called **imps** were sent by Satan to do evil work on Earth. After causing mayhem in Northern England, the two imps headed to Lincoln Cathedral, where they smashed tables and chairs and tripped up the Bishop. When an angel came out of a book of hymns and told them to stop, one of the imps was brave and started throwing rocks at the angel, but the other imp cowered under the broken tables and chairs. The angel turned the first imp to stone, giving the second imp a chance to escape. It is said that even on still days it is always windy around the Cathedral, which is the second imp is circling the building looking for his friend





#### **MAGNA CARTA**

Magna Carta, meaning 'The Great Charter', is one of the most famous documents in the world. Originally issued by King John of England as a practical solution to the political crisis he faced in 1215, Magna Carta established for the first time the principle that everybody, including the king, was subject to the law. Although nearly a third of the text was deleted or substantially rewritten within ten years, and almost all the clauses have been repealed in modern times, Magna Carta remains a cornerstone of the British constitution. Most of the 63 clauses granted by King John dealt with specific grievances relating to his rule. However, buried within them were a n umber of fundamental values that both challenged the autocracy of the king and proved highly adaptable in future centuries. Most famously, the 39th clause gave all 'free men' the right to justice



and a fair trial. Some of Magna Carta's core principles are echoed in the United States Bill of Rights (1791) and in many other constitutional documents around the world, as well as in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (1948) and the European Convention on Human Rights (1950)

#### **MEDIEVAL BISHOPS' PALACE**

Standing almost in the shadow of Lincoln cathedral, with sweeping views over the ancient city and the countryside beyond, the medieval bishops' palace was once among the most important buildings in the country. The administrative centre of the largest diocese in medieval England, stretching from the Humber to the Thames, its architecture reflected enormous power and wealth. Explore the site as part of a day out in Lincoln. Guided by our audio tour, see the undercroft East Hall and also the chapel range and entrance tower built by Bishop William Alnwick, who modernised the palace in the 1430s

#### 12:00-4:00pm DODDINGTON HALL AND GARDENS



Over 400 years of unbroken family occupation has resulted in fascinating collections of furniture, weaponry, paintings, ceramics, textiles, household objects, porcelain and a wealth of amusing stories all to be found in and around Doddington Hall. A visit to Doddington offers a unique insight into family life through the ages and the challenges of looking after such an estate in the 21st century. For many, the Gardens at Doddington are just as spectacular as the Hall itself. Remaining faithful to the original Elizabethan layout, mellow walls provide the framework for the formal East Front and West Gardens. Beyond the West Gardens begin the lovingly restored Wild Gardens. Over the generations, most recently by Antony and Victoria Jarvis and Claire and James Birch, the gardens at Doddington have been restored, cared for, nurtured and developed to their fullest potential

#### THE USHER GALLERY AND COLLECTION

The Usher Gallery was officially opened on 25th May 1927 by the Prince of Wales and the new building was opened in October 2005 after much hard work including an archaeological excavation. Visitors can head to the auditorium where video or personal introductions to the museum where the archaeological collection or the New Curtois Gallery, where touring exhibitions are housed. Below these last two, at the downhill end of the building, are the stores and workshops which service the whole. The Usher Gallery, along with The Collection, displays a fine collection of fine and decorative arts and plays host to a huge variety of contemporary art exhibitions throughout the year. Alongside these they regularly put on talks and events that add another dimension to your experience of the exhibitions and displays on show

If time permits, take some time in Lincoln to shop around **Steep Hill** and visit **Guildhall** and **Stone bow.** 





#### **STEEP HILL**

Find specialty, vintage and retro stores on Steep Hill, voted 'Britain's Best Street'. The Strait, at the

bottom end of Steep Hill has a range of fashion and designer stores. Discover the history of Lincoln by shopping on Steep Hill and The Strait. These lovely old streets offer a wide variety of independent and specialty shops, a lot of them housed in the oldest buildings of the city. This shopping area provides a great selection of food and drink, exclusive and vintage clothing, old bookstores and other specialty shops



#### **GUIDLHALL AND STONEBOW**

An early 16th century town building which forms an archway over the main High Street and home to City Council meetings and the heritage of Lincoln's local politics. The Guildhall has been used since its construction in 1520, occupying the whole second floor of the Stonebow, and still plays host to Full Council meetings and City Council events. It houses numerous pieces of regalia, including the sword of Richard II, Mayor's Chains of Office and Mayor's posy ring. The word Stonebow comes from the ancient Norse word stennibogi which means stone arch

DAY 7 LINCOLN – BLETCHLEY PARK – OXFORD Tuesday 11th July 2017 (B)

**Main Group** Today you will spend some time at the Lincolnshire Aviation Heritage Centre

9:30-5:00pm LINCOLNSHIRE AVIATION HERITAGE CENTRE

> The Lincolnshire Aviation Heritage Centre is a family run museum and was set up over 20 years ago. It is now widely seen as a living memorial to the 55,500 men of Bomber Command who lost their lives during WW2. It holds one of the rarest aircraft, an Avro Lancaster Bomber, in its collection along with many wartime vehicles including a Ford WOT1 Crew Bus, the only one of its kind known in existence. The Museum is built up entirely around RAF Bomber Command but the exhibits and displays span many areas such as The Home Front and Escape and Evasion giving you a wide perspective on wartime Britain and the trials and tribulation of the Second World War



#### **Alternative**

#### **BURGHLEY HOUSE**

11:00-5:00pm One of the greatest of Britain's non-royal palaces, a prodigy house built for Elizabeth I's Lord High Treasurer, Lord Burghley. His interiors include a Great Hall with hammerbeam roof and vaulted Old Kitchen. Later Earls of Exeter have endowed the building with magnificent collections (including perhaps the finest private collection of 17th century Italian paintings) and an opulent series of state rooms, including the famous Heaven Room painted by Verrio

The coach will come back to Lincoln to pick up the aviation group while the partners are at Burghley

Meet as a group in Burghley and depart for **Bletchley Park** 





#### Afternoon Lunch will be en route to Bletchley or at Bletchley Park

#### **BLETCHLEY PARK**

Once Britain's best kept secret, today Bletchley Park is a heritage site and vibrant tourist attraction. You can explore some of the iconic World War 2 Codebreaking Huts and Blocks and marvel at the astonishing achievements of the Codebreakers whose work is said to have shortened the war by two years



After spending time at the Park, drive approximately an hour to **Oxford**

10:30-5:30pm BLENHEIM PALACE

A true masterpiece of 18th Century Baroque architecture, Blenheim Palace delivers an awe-inspiring experience for visitors. The stunning State Rooms are brimming with priceless works of art and



magnificent tapestries. Discover the beauty of this World Heritage Site amongst over 2000 acres of 'Capability' Brown parkland and Formal Gardens with a water garden. Ride the miniature train to the Pleasure Gardens which offers a giant hedge maze, butterfly house and adventure playground. Tours, exhibitions and events reveal the sheer splendor of one of Britain's greatest palaces. Blenheim Palace is more than another one of England's stately homes. Take a **tour of the Blenheim Palace State Rooms** where their own guide will bring the history of this fabulous palace to life

Blenheim Palace is a multi-faceted attraction, providing a range of things to do including:

- Take a self-guided tour through the Palace. NOTE that there will be guides in each room
- Self-guided tour of Blenheim Palace: the Untold Story, a new "visitor experience" featuring animated figures and sound effects
- Churchill Exhibition, including the room of Churchill's birth
- Several formal gardens including the Italian Garden, the Water Terraces, and, in season, a stunning rose garden
- The Pleasure Gardens Reached from its own small parking lot or, between April and October via the estate's own narrow gauge railway, the Pleasure Gardens include a maze and a butterfly house





#### 11:00-5:00pm SIR WINSTON CHURCHILL

Winston Churchill was an inspirational statesman, writer, orator and leader who led Britain to victory in the Second World War. He served as Conservative Prime Minister twice - from 1940 to 1945 and from 1951 to 1955. In January 1965 Sir Winston Churchill was buried in the churchyard at the head of the grave of Lady Randolph Churchill his mother. His father, Lord Randolph Churchill is buried alongside.

He was given a state funeral and his last farewell was a grand affair with the Queen, members of the royal family, statesmen and diplomatic representatives from 112 countries attended his service at St. Paul's Cathedral

#### Afternoon Lunch today is by individual arrangement

After lunch, take a **guided tour of Oxford** and the famous Colleges and Libraries. You may choose to visit some of the colleges or choose to see them all

The colleges in Oxford date back to the 13th century and among its famous students were Bill Clinton, C.S. Lewis, J.R.R. Tolkien and Lewis Carroll. We take you on a fascinating walking tour, which includes visiting the Great Hall in Christ Church, where many scenes from Harry Potter were filmed. We'll also see the Bodleian Library and the picture perfect college courtyards for which Oxford is famous. You can visit only the colleges with a Harry Potter connection or choose others. Christ Church, New College and Magdalen are considered three of the finest

#### 10:00-4:15pm CHRIST CHURCH

Christ Church is perhaps the most famous and most visited college in Oxford. Its origin dates back to the 16th century. Christ Church Cathedral (Church of England) is also the seat of Bishop of Oxford. Christ Church has also been made popular by the Harry Potter movies. Key things to look out for here are the cathedral of Oxford and the impressive Tom Quad with a fountain and statue of Mercury in the middle. The main entrance to Christ Church (though tourists are not permitted to enter thorough this gate) is called the Tom Tower named after



the enclosed Great Tom bell. The bell tolls 101 times at 9:05 every night. Though it is largely symbolic now, in its early days, this was to inform all 100 (and later 101) Christ Church scholars to return to the college before the college gates shut. Another interesting trivia to note is the timing - 9:05pm and not 9:00 pm. This is because technically Oxford is 5 minutes behind Greenwich (where the Prime Meridian and GMT is defined). Hence 9:05 is actually 9:00pm in Oxford's time zone!

#### 11:00-5:00pm NEW COLLEGE

New College is believed by many to be an amazing college to visit. The college was founded in 1379. The amazing, but eerie pretty cloisters, bell tower, chapel, dining hall, quad, mound, lawn, garden and a 1000-year old city wall, there is quite a bit to see here. Also, while you are here, keep an eye out for the grotesque gargoyles! Entrance is either via the main gate on New College Lane (Easter to early October) or Holywell gate on Holywell Street (winter)

#### 10:00-5:00pm BALLIOL COLLEGE

Balliol has existed as a community of scholars on its present Broad Street site without interruption since about 1263. By this token it claims to be the oldest college in Oxford, and in the English-speaking world. In 1260 a dispute between John de Balliol and the Bishop of Durham erupted into violence and Henry III condemned Balliol's behaviour. The Bishop had Balliol whipped, and imposed a penance on him of a substantial act of charity.







This he did, by renting a property and creating a house of scholars, which was soon known by his name. After John de Balliol's death in 1269, his widow, Dervorguilla of Galloway, guaranteed the future of the 'House of the Scholars of Balliol' by establishing a permanent endowment and giving it Statutes in 1282 – so bringing into being Balliol College as we know it today. The College celebrated its 750th anniversary in 2013. The College's patron saint is St Catherine of Alexandria. The College arms, taken from the back of Dervorguilla's seal, show a lion rampant for Galloway and an orle for Balliol

#### 2:00-5:00pm LINCOLN COLLEGE

Founded by Bishop Richard Fleming in 1427, Lincoln College is now one of the best preserved of the medieval colleges. Fleming intended the college to be 'a little college of true students of theology who would defend the mysteries of Scripture against those ignorant laymen who profaned with swinish snouts its most holy pearls'. The hall maintains its original roof, including a gap where smoke would escape

#### 12:00-7:00pm MAGDALEN COLLEGE

Founded in 1458 by William of Waynflete, the bishop of Winchester, Magdalen is Oxfords wealthiest and arguably most beautiful college, with its own deer park and beautiful cloisters, of whose gargoyles supposedly inspired CS Lewis' stone statues in The Chronicles of Narnia. On the far right of the grounds, a bright blue wrought iron gate leads to Addison's Walk, a pretty riverside path

#### 9:00-7:00pm BODLEIAN LIBRARY

Oxford's libraries are among the most celebrated in the world, not only for their incomparable collections of books and manuscripts, but also for their buildings, some of which have remained in continuous use since the Middle Ages. Among them the Bodleian, the chief among the University's libraries, has a special place. First opened to scholars in 1602, it incorporates an earlier library erected by the University in the fifteenth century to house books donated by Humfrey, Duke of Gloucester. Since 1602 it has expanded, slowly at first but with increasing momentum over the last 150 years, to



keep pace with the ever-growing accumulation of books and papers, but the core of the old buildings has remained intact. These buildings are still used by students and scholars from all over the world, and they attract an ever-increasing number of visitors, for whose benefit this guide has been written

#### 9:00-5:00pm THE DIVINITY SCHOOL

Explore the Divinity School, completed in 1488 for the teaching of theology. With its elaborately vaulted ceiling and its 455 carved bosses, it is a masterpiece of English Gothic architecture. This splendid room is the University's earliest purpose built teaching room, and its first examination hall. The Divinity School, was used as Hogwarts Infirmary in Harry Potter films. It was also used as the room where Harry Potter and his friends learned to dance

The Ashmolean Museum is home to the University's collection of art and archaeology. Founded in 1683 it is the first public museum in the UK and one of the oldest in the world. The collections span the civilisations of east and west, charting the aspirations of humankind from the Neolithic era to the present day. Among its treasures are the world's largest collection of Raphael drawings, the most important collection of pre-Dynastic Egyptian material in Europe, the only great Minoan collection in Britain, the finest Anglo-Saxon collections outside the British Museum and the foremost collection of modern Chinese art in the Western world. The Ashmolean is also a teaching and research department of the University of Oxford, providing research and publications of the highest standard in the academic fields of art history, archaeology and history

#### **OPTIONAL** SUDELEY CASTLE

10:00-5:00pm Set against the dramatic backdrop of the Cotswolds, in an area of outstanding natural beauty, Sudeley Castle & Gardens contains many fascinating treasures from ancient Roman times to the present day. Outside, the castle is surrounded by awardwinning gardens and a breathtaking 1,200 acre estate – all in the heart of the Cotswolds. It has played an important role in

the turbulent and changing times of England's past, with royal connections that stretch back over 1000 years. Today it is a much loved family home and popular visitor attraction.

#### **PUBLIC ART**

Discover some of Guildford's prominent public art and the story of the artists, the works and how they relate to Guildford's past. Find out about artists such as John Russell and G.F. Watts who have strong Guildford connections. See works of art by Faith Winter, Janine Creaye, Jeanne Argent and grasp some of the techniques used to create these works of art. Understand why prominent art is where it is in Guildford and its connection to Guildford's past. Appreciate how national and local businesses have contributed to



the urban fabric of Guildford with the integration of art into buildings and public spaces throughout the town

#### **LEWIS CARROLL**



For nearly 30 years, this famous author spent part of each year at his unmarried sisters' home, The Chestnuts, where he died in 1898. On this walk you will see the buildings associated with him and hear how he spent his days writing, visiting and taking photographs. This walk celebrates the life and times of the Rev. Charles Lutwidge Dodgson, better known as Lewis Carroll, his connections with Guildford and the surrounding area. #### WINDSOR CASTLE

Windsor Castle is the oldest and largest occupied castle in the world and is the Official Residence of Her Majesty the Queen. Windsor Castle has a rich history spanning more than 1,000 years. It is an official residence of Her Majesty the Queen, whose standard flies from the Round Tower when she is in residence



#### **The State Apartments**

The State Apartments are furnished with some of the finest works of art from the Royal Collection, including paintings by Rembrandt, Rubens and Canaletto. Many of the works of art are still in the historic settings for which they were first collected or commissioned by the Kings and Queens who have lived at Windsor

#### Queen Mary's Dolls' House

Among the highlights of a visit to Windsor is Queen Mary's Dolls' House, the largest, most beautiful and most famous dolls' house in the world. Built for Queen Mary by the leading British architect Sir Edwin Lutyens between 1921 and 1924, this most magical of residences is a perfect replica in miniature of an aristocratic home. The house is filled with thousands of objects made by leading artists, designers and craftsmen. From life below stairs to the high-society setting of the saloon and dining room, no detail was forgotten. Among the most striking features of Queen Mary's Dolls' House are the library, bursting with original works by the top literary names of the day, a fully stocked wine cellar and a garden created by Gertrude Jekyll. The Dolls' House even includes electricity, running hot and cold water, working lifts and flushing lavatories

#### The Semi-State Rooms

One of the best times of the year to visit Windsor Castle is between September and March, when the spectacular private apartments created for George IV are open. These Semi-State Rooms are among the most richly decorated interiors in the Castle and are used by The Queen for official entertaining. George IV had a well-developed love of fine objects and a taste for the theatrical. With his architect, Sir Jeffry Wyatville, he completely remodelled the Castle's exterior during the 1820s, giving it the romantic and picturesque appearance seen



today. He also decided to create a new suite of private rooms on the sunnier east and south sides of the Castle. This was George IV's last and greatest commission, and one of the most lavish and costly interior decoration schemes ever carried out in England

#### St George's Chapel

St George's Chapel is one of the finest examples of Gothic architecture in England and is particularly noted for its magnificent stone fan vaulting. It is the spiritual home of the Order of the Garter, the senior order of British Chivalry established in 1348 by Edward III. Within the chapel are the tombs of ten sovereigns, including Henry VIII and his third wife Jane Seymour and Charles I







#### **Changing the Guard**

The privilege of guarding the Sovereign traditionally belongs to the Household Troops, better known as 'the Guards', who have carried out this duty since 1660. For operational and other reasons, this privilege is periodically extended to other regiments of the British Army. The Guards consist of five infantry regiments – the Grenadier, Coldstream, Scots, Irish and Welsh Guards – and two regiments of the Household Cavalry – the Life Guards and Blues and Royals.



Changing the Guard, also known as 'Guard Mounting', begins with the Windsor Castle Guard forming up outside the Guard Room. In due course, the new Guard will arrive, led by a Regimental Band, Corps of Drums or occasionally by a Pipe Band. During the 45-minute ceremony, the handover of duties will take place, including the changeover of sentries. At the conclusion of the ceremony, the old Guard will return to Victoria Barracks in Windsor town. When The Queen is in official residence, the parade takes place on the Castle Forecourt

#### **Windsor Castle Shops**

The three shops around Windsor Castle offer a wide range of exclusive gift items inspired by the works of art in the Royal Collection, many of which are displayed at Windsor Castle. You can purchase homeware, china, clothing and jewellery, children's toys, books and postcards

The income from every purchase you make contributes directly to the care of the Royal Collection, which is held in trust by The Queen for her successors and the nation. The Collection is administered by the Royal Collection Trust, a registered charity. The aims of the Trust are the care and conservation of the Royal Collection and the promotion of public access and enjoyment through exhibitions, publications, loans and educational activities

Brooklands was the world's first purpose-built motor racing circuit and was constructed at Weybridge, Surrey in 1907. It was more than a great sporting arena. The Museum displays a wide range of Brooklands-related motoring and aviation exhibits ranging from giant racing cars, motorcycles and bicycles to an unparalleled collection of Hawker and Vickers/ BAC-built aircraft, including the Second World War Wellington Bomber, Viking, Varsity, Viscount, Vanguard, VC10, BAC One-Eleven and the only Concorde with public access in South East England

You will have time to take part in a guided tour as well as the unique Concorde Experience

#### **CONCORDE EXPERIENCE**

Take your set as the Captain welcomes you and he is given the instruction "Concorde Speedbird One cleared for take-off". See, hear and feel Concorde blast along the runway, soar into the sky and accelerate to Mach 2 – twice the speed of sound. Re-live the excitement of the supersonic age in this fascinating Concorde "flight". Choose from the following experiences:

#### THE BRITISH AIRWAYS CONCORDE SIMULATOR

The Concorde Simulator was commissioned in 1975 as one of just two in the world, at a cost of about £3 million - over £20 million at today's prices. One of the most sophisticated aircraft simulators ever created, it was installed at the British Aircraft Corporation at Filton near Bristol and, for 28 years, was used to train all British Airways Concorde aircrew. When Concorde operations ceased at the end of 2003, BA decommissioned the simulator and, a year later, it was dismantled and transported to Brooklands Museum. As a result of a three-year project, initially funded by the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC), led by a team of volunteers from the Museum and the University of Surrey, along with the expert assistance of XPI Simulation, this unique piece of aviation technology is being flown again as a fixed-base unit - the only operational Concorde Simulator in the world

There are several levels of this experience and we recommend either the Technical Concorde Experience or the Concorde Simulator Experience subject to availability. The Technical Concorde Experience explores the fascinating technical achievements of the aircraft. There will also be the opportunity to sit on Concorde's Flight Deck, and spend time on board the Concorde Simulator as she takes off from London Heathrow, flies a low-level pass over Brooklands and lands back at Heathrow. The Concorde Simulator Experience includes actually flying the Concorde Simulator, with one of the Concorde Captains. Both these experiences are generally scheduled for specific days, however if you are interested, we will enquire as to the availability of these experiences for you as a group

#### **DELUXE CONCORDE EXPERIENCE**

Chartwell was the much-loved Churchill family home and the place from which Sir Winston drew inspiration from 1924 until the end of his life. The rooms remain much as they were when he lived here, with pictures, books and personal mementoes evoking the career and wide-ranging interests of a great statesman, writer, painter and family man. Additionally, every winter we put on a new temporary exhibition to explore Churchill in more detail and draw items out of storage. The hillside gardens reflect Sir Winston's love of the landscape and



nature. They include the lakes he created, the kitchen garden and the Marycot, a playhouse designed for his youngest daughter Mary. Beyond the gardens there is an expanse of woodland with looped trails, natural play areas and swings. There's den building, a Canadian camp and opportunities to stretch your legs

The Tower of London is the home of the famous Beefeaters, known officially as the Yeomen Warders of Her



Majesty's Royal Palace and Fortress the Tower of London and Members of the Sovereign's Body Guard of the Yeoman Guard Extraordinary. These are ceremonial guardians of the Tower of London. In principle they are responsible for looking after any prisoners in the Tower and safeguarding the British crown jewels, but in practice they act as tour guides and are a tourist attraction in their own right, a point the Yeoman Warders acknowledge

Highlights include the Rosetta Stone, the Parthenon sculptures and the mummies in the Ancient Egypt collection

It has been the setting for every Coronation since 1066 and for numerous royal occasions including the funeral of Princess Diana in 1997 and the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton, now the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge

#### 9:00-5:00pm HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT

The **Palace of Westminster** is the meeting place of the House of Commons and the House of Lords, the two houses of the Parliament of the United Kingdom. Commonly known as the **Houses of Parliament** after its tenants, the Palace lies on the Middlesex bank of the River Thames in the City of Westminster, in central London. Its name, which derives from the neighbouring Westminster Abbey, may refer to either of two structures: the Old Palace, a medieval building complex that was destroyed by fire in 1834 and its replacement New Palace that stands today. For ceremonial purposes, the palace retains its original style and status as a royal residence

**Big Ben** is one of London's most famous landmarks. The name Big Ben is often used to describe the tower, the clock and the bell, but the name was first given to the Great Bell. The Elizabeth Tower, which stands at the north end of the Houses of Parliament, was completed in 1859 with the Great Clock started on 31 May, the Great Bell's strikes heard for the first time on 11 July and the quarter bells first chimed on 7 September

#### 10:00-5:00pm BANQUETING HOUSE

This is the only remaining part of the Palace of Whitehall which was burnt down in the 17th Century. This national monument is perhaps best known as the site of the execution of Charles I in 1649. This masterpiece ceiling painting of Peter Paul Rubens is one of the most famous from a golden age. **The Banqueting House** building is one of the first examples of the principles of Palladianism being applied to an English building, and marks the start of a revolution in B ritish architecture. Although renowned



for its architecture, Banqueting House is probably most famous for a significant event, the execution of King Charles I on 30 January 1649

This afternoon, visit the Imperial War Museum

#### 10:00-6:00pm IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM

The Imperial War Museum tells the stories of peoples' experiences of modern war and conflict. Visit ground-breaking First World War Galleries which tell the story of the First World War – how it started, why it continued and its global impact, through the lives of those who experienced it
